> Message from the Chair & CEO

West Park Hospital's year 2014 was filled with accomplishments, challenges and change. We have made accomplishments in improving our quality, safety, patient and family experience. We continue to proactively respond to the new era of healthcare driven by the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act and other regulatory changes mandated by the Centers of Medicare and Medicaid Services.

West Park Hospital has experienced many exciting changes this last year that we are pleased to share with you. We invite you to take a moment to review this annual report, which highlights our accomplishments and changes in 2014.

We would like to thank the many members of the WPH team, including the Hospital Board, WPH Foundation Board, Leadership and Management, Medical Staff, Employees, and Hospital Volunteers for their loyalty and passion for serving our community.

In this past year, West Park Hospital initiated our "Bridge to the Future" renovation and expansion project. This project is the final phase of our facility master plan approved by the WPH Board of Trustees in 2006

and updated in 2012. The first of three phases was the Construction of the Cathcart Health Center in 2009; second phase was the completion of the Modernization Project renovation and construction project in 2012, and the Bridge to the Future project is projected to be completed in October, 2015.

To meet the needs of those we serve, West Park Hospital continually looks for ways to expand and strengthen our medical staff to ensure our patients have access to quality care close to home. The hospital added several new physicians to our active medical staff in 2014, including ENT Randy Folker, MD, Hospitalist Tyler Weaver, MD, Neurosurgeon Jeff Poffenbarger, MD, and Urgent Care/Emergency Department Alex Cianflone. MD.

New services added at West Park **Hospital** include our new Stereo Tactic Breast Biopsy equipment allowing women a more convenient option for having breast biopsies. Also, we are excited to announce the addition of Dr. Brandi Shepard. Audiologist, who will offer full service audiology.

A special thanks and appreciation to the WPH Foundation Board. Through the generosity of the community, these board members raised over \$1,080,000 this year. The donations, pledges, and grants received in 2014 support a number of beneficial hospital projects

including the Baker Community Education Center, the Oncology Clinic in the Big Horn Basin Cancer Center, and continued support for Spirit Mountain Hospice House, along with needed hospital equipment purchases.

This annual report provides a representative snapshot of what occurred at West Park Hospital in 2014. As a result, the collective efforts of the West Park Hospital family have our organization wellpositioned for both the known and unforeseen challenges of the future. The achievements made in 2014 were due to a tremendous effort and countless individual contributions by hospital staff, physicians, volunteers and board leadership. 
Advanced Neurosurgical Care

West Park Hospital and Big Horn Bone & Joint have partnered together to bring the first neurosurgeon to the Big Horn Basin in over seven years. Neurosurgeon, **Dr. Jeff Poffenbarger**, is a Texas native who earned his medical degree at Georgetown University Medical School in Washington, D.C., and served for 22 years in the Army.

Dr. Poffenbarger brings expertise in the treatment of Neurosurgical care including: Complex spinal instrumentation for degenerative disease and trauma, and minimally invasive spine surgery. He also treats intracranial disease such as tumors, hydrocephalus and Chiara malformation.



Our hospitalist offer help to people in life threatening and dangerous situations and truly make a difference within our facility. Seeing their work and the work of our care team at **WPH** rapidly improves the lives of our patients in these situations.

Some may wonder why we offer a hospitalist program at **WPH**. There are several great benefits that a hospitalist program brings to a community. First, it improves patient care. Hospitalists bring extra experience and accessibility to patients in the hospital. Hospitalist are much more easily available to take part in the hospital care team, and to meet with patients and their families throughout the day because they are not in an outpatient clinic. Hospitalists also bring additional focused knowledge on common patient-care challenges and ICU level care.

Second, a hospitalist program revitalizes primary care in a community: it takes the burden off night-time call and rounding in the hospital off of primary care doctors and allows them to focus on taking care of patients in the clinic. Because of this, we can improve retention and recruitment of primary care doctors for our community.

Finally, hospitalists are not just doctors in the hospital, they are doctors for the hospital. Hospitalist don't just treat patients, but improve hospital processes. They are active in improving how the hospital treats patients efficiently and effectively. In turn, this creates and reinforces processes that result in excellent care.





ERGENCY MEDICAL SERVIC

West Park Hospital's Emergency Medical Services (EMS) is the only paramedic level service in the Big Horn Basin. Each Unit is staffed with a paramedic and an EMT-Intermediate. We currently serve over 5,000 square miles with some transport times greater than 1.5 hours. Because of our staffing of paramedics, this allows our patients to receive the highest pre-hospital care available.

Paramedics are licensed to provide advanced care in medical and trauma emergencies. All staff maintain proficiency by attending monthly training and education classes. Paramedics also train with specialty physicians in advanced procedures. These physicians specialize in emergency medicine, anesthesia and trauma surgery.

The year 2014 marked a year of change for the **West Park Hospital EMS department**. In the spring we increased our staffing model so that we could fully staff two ambulances 24/7 and 365 days a year. The hospital purchased two new ambulances that were delivered in June. These replaced two older ambulances with high mileage. The new staffing has already proven to reduce the response times for both emergency and hospital transfers.

WPH EMS staff has become integrated within the hospital so that they can assist other departments within the hospital. This allows the EMS department to offer help when other departments are short staffed or in the case of high volumes.

In 2015 West Park EMS department has established goals that will take aim at increasing our services to the community while still focusing on improving our current services. We will be implementing a "Community Para-medicine Program." This program is a new and evolving model of community based healthcare in which paramedics function outside their customary emergency response and transport roles in ways to enhance access to primary care for medically underserved populations.

WPH EMS intends to commission a Wilderness response vehicle and an EMS Special Events Team. The EMS Special Events Team will have mountain bikes equipped to provide medical care during special events such as parades, running and walking events and our hospital's community health events.

The Wildness Truck is designed to get our people and equipment into remote places we could otherwise not get to with conventional ambulances. The unit will be modified to have high clearance and can carry the response equipment used by our specially trained wilderness response team.

Included equipment:

- Survival gear for multiple overnights in any season,
- Equipment racks for mountain bike response team
- Satellite telephone
- Climbing equipment for high angle scenes
- Wilderness litters for patient extraction

In 2014 The Wyoming Trauma Program granted our institution full designation as an Area Trauma Hospital. Assignment of this designation level is for a period of three years, and will be up for full review in 2016.

Kelli Perrotti, Wyoming Trauma Program Manager said, "West Park Hospital's obvious commitment to the development of their trauma program is to be commended. This designation demonstrates your institution's dedication to providing quality patient care for your community and the residents of Wyoming."

West Park Hospital will continue to meet these standards to obtain this designation in the future.

In 2015 we will continue to educate our community on when they need to visit our emergency department versus our urgent care facility.

Emergency Medicine

Thomas Cuisine has over 24 years' experience in healthcare dining and maintains a 98% customer retention rate.

Supporting our local farms in the area was also a main goal for us at West Park. Thomas Cuisine's leadership has allowed us to utilize these connections with Wyoming and Montana farms.

By next October 2015, our dietary department will be moving to a new location within the hospital where they will be equipped with new appliances, a new tray line for patients and a new Pizza oven out in the cafe! Most of the food will be cooked to order, which will help cut down line time for people waiting on food.


Baker Community Education Center (Complete Fall 2015)






